LET THE LIGHT SHINE IN: TRANSPARENCY IN ANIMAL SHELTERING

Trust: it is the foundation of every important relationship in our lives, including our relationships with charities. When we give our precious time or our hard-earned dollars, we trust that charities will do what they pledge to do and, when the work is done, tell us where they succeeded and where they failed.

At Animal Allies Humane Society, we are part of a national movement toward transparency in animal sheltering. The singular aim of that movement: straightforward public reporting of the outcome for every animal who enters a shelter.

The vehicle for transparency in animal sheltering is known as Asilomar Reporting. Like the nutrition information on packaged food, Asilomar Reporting provides a uniform format and terminology for the communication of animal shelter results. All of the 2009 results for both Animal Allies and the City of Duluth Animal Shelter are now posted at www.animalallies.net. We hope you will take a look.

The most important component of Asilomar Reporting is the Live Release Rate. The Live Release Rate is the percentage of all animals that leave a shelter alive via owner reclaim, adoption, or transfer to another shelter. At Animal Allies in 2009, our live release for cats and dogs was 96%, well above the national average of around 50%.

Live Release Rate can also be measured at the community level, by pooling results for all animal shelters in a community. In 2009, the live release rate for animals that entered either Animal Allies or the City of Duluth Animal Shelter was 88% (83% for cats and 94% for dogs).

On a national level, an 88% live release rate is very good, but we are determined to do better. Animal Allies' goal is to increase Duluth's community live release rate to 92% in 2012. Only a small handful of cities have achieved a rate above 90%. (At least 5-to-7% of homeless animals are beyond medical help or dangerously aggressive. As a result, 93-to-95% is thought to be the maximum possible live release rate.)

The second important component of Asilomar Reporting is the euthanasia statistics. Every euthanized animal is categorized according to quidelines as Healthy. Treatable, or Unhealthy/Untreatable. Of the 348 animals euthanized at Duluth's two shelters last year, 59 were Healthy, 63 were Treatable, 165 were Unhealthy and Untreatable, and 61 were feral cats. All of the Healthy animals were euthanized by the City of Duluth Animal Shelter when spiking shelter intake overtook kennel capacity and the availability of adoptive homes. Though these statistics may seem morbid, and they are certainly grim, the numbers help us save lives. The 2009 statistics inspired

the City of Duluth and Animal Allies to set the shared goal of eliminating euthanasia of healthy animals at either shelter in 2010

The numbers also foster accountability to the community we serve. Next year at this time, we will report the full 2010 animal results. I hope that the numbers will reflect continued progress but I cannot promise that. I can promise that the numbers will tell the truth, the good and the bad.

Thank you for all you have done to help save so many more animals. Thank you also for what you will do to help our community end the euthanasia of healthy animals in 2010.

WHAT IS A FOSTER FAMILY?

A foster family offers a temporary home for an animal that is waiting for adoption. A foster family provides playtime, socialization, nutritious food, plenty of exercise, training and companionship for a period of days up to several months.

WHAT TYPES OF CASES DO YOU SEND TO FOSTER HOMES?

- Kittens and puppies under 8 weeks
- Animals who need additional recovery time post-surgery
- Animals needing more socialization or behavior training

CHALLENGES OF FOSTERING:

Foster families may experience a sense of loss when the animals leave their foster care to be adopted. Also, the occasional loss of an animal that is too weak or too ill is as heartbreaking as losing your own pet.

SPRINGTIME SAFETY TIPS FOR OUR FELINE FRIENDS

Thoughts from Adoption Manager, Stefanie Kemp

It's true — spring is here at last. While we're enjoying unusually warm weather for this time of year, our feline friends want to get out there and bask in the new grass, too. A great time to let them out? Well, let's consider a few safety factors before you fling open that door.

The average lifespan of an indoor only cat is many years longer than that of an outdoor pet. Indoor cats live a healthier, longer and safer life, while cats that are left outdoors to roam are suddenly at a high risk for injury or death, either from being hit by a motorized vehicle or attacked by a predator. Dangerous diseases and harmful bacteria lurk in grass and soil left behind by outdoor animals, making our beloved pets easy victims. Outdoor cats are also at risk for "rescue" by a new family, tormenting by children, or possible harm by a nonfeline friendly person. So how can you let your cat join in on

the outdoor fun? The safest route is by harness training and walking with them, or by providing a screened-in enclosure in your yard. Remember that most city ordinances, Duluth and Superior included, require that all outside animals be either leashed or safely fenced. City ordinances also state that animals must be licensed, whether they go outside or not.

To protect both you and your pet, make sure that your cat is wearing

proper ID tags on his collar, especially for those who may occasionally sneak out. It's a sad fact that fewer than 4% of strays are claimed by their owners. The City of Duluth Animal Control took in more than 700 cats in 2009. While the vast majority were strays, very few were reunited with their families. If these

cats had been wearing an ID tag or microchip, or were never let out to roam in the first place, there would be far less homeless felines in our area's crowded shelters.

So, as winter draws to a close and we embrace the warmth of spring, please remember these few tips on how to keep your cat safe, healthy and at home. Your time together is precious: make sure you enjoy every moment.
